P R O C L A M A T I O N

Whereas, Glenwood Elmo Hankins was one of the area's two remaining survivors of the D-Day Invasion at Normandy, passed away on Saturday, February 7, 2015.

Whereas, Glenwood Elmo Hankins, honorably and loyally served in Company H of the 116th Infantry Regiment, 29th Infantry Division of the Virginia National Guard;

Whereas, Glenwood Elmo Hankins, served in the 29th Infantry Division which was part of the first wave of 150,000 Allied troops who stormed the beaches of Normandy during the D-Day Invasion which included more than 5,000 ships and 11,000 aircraft and left nearly 10,000 Allied soldiers killed or wounded;

Whereas, Glenwood Elmo Hankins, was awarded the Military Order of the Purple Heart;

Whereas, Glenwood Elmo Hankins, was awarded the France's Ordre Royale de la Legion D'Honneur, or Legion of Honor, which is the equivalent of being knighted in France;

Whereas, Glenwood Elmo Hankins, has continually brought pride and recognition to the City of Martinsville serving with the Veterans Honor Guard and a long time employee of the local post office in Uptown and at Druid Hills;

Whereas, Glenwood Elmo Hankins and his family remain a source of inspiration and a reminder of his World War II service and sacrifice to the City of Martinsville and all of its residents;

Now, therefore, I, Danny Turner, Mayor of the City of Martinsville, do join with the Martinsville City Council, February 10, 2015, in honoring

WHEREAS, the mission of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP) is to ensure the political, educational, social, and economic equality of rights of all persons and to eliminate race-based discrimination;

WHEREAS, the Martinsville-Henry County Chapter of the NAACP strives to fulfill the principal objectives of the national organization, including the following:

To insure the political, education, social, and economic equality of all citizens;

To achieve equality of rights and eliminate race prejudice among the citizens of the United States;

To remove all barriers of racial discrimination through democratic processes;

To see enactment and enforcement of federal, state, and local laws securing civil rights;

To inform the public of the adverse effects of racial discrimination and to seek its elimination;

To educate persons as to their constitutional rights and to take all lawful action to secure the exercise thereof and to take any other lawful action in furtherance of these objectives, consistent with the NAACP's Articles of Incorporation and its Constitution;



Martinsville Police Department *Select Group A Crimes* 2005 - 2014




Definition of Select Group A Offenses:
